




I am sure, this Report would provide a deeper insight into the functioning of ICCR. We welcome feedback from all of you including all your valuable suggestions.

### Introduction

he Indian Council for Cultural Relations (ICCR) was founded to actively participate in the formulation and implementation of policies and programmes pertaining to India's external cultural relations; to foster and strengthen cultural relations and mutual understanding between India and other countries; to promote cultural exchanges with other countries and their people; and to deepen all round relations with nations.

Established in 1951, ICCR is a society registered in the year 1957 under Society Registration Act 1860. ICCR was founded by Maulana Abul Kalam Azad when he was the Minister of Education. The organization was under the administrative control of the Ministry of Education and Youth Affairs till 1970. Since its mandate involved interaction with foreign entities, ICCR was

in 1970 transferred from Ministry of Human Resource Development to the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA). Since then it has been functioning as an autonomous body under the administrative control of MEA.

ICCR is an important instrument of the Govt. of India to project and promote India's Soft Power overseas. With its wide outreach overseas, by way of its Culture Centres and Diplomatic Missions & Posts, and within the country, through its regional offices and thereby collaborations with the State governments, and an array of well-designed and targeted programmes, ICCR is well equipped to establish appropriate linkages with the world. Over the years it has become the "cultural arm" of the Ministry of External Affairs to successfully achieve its stated objectives.

### ICCR Structure

#### **Constitution & Statutory Bodies**

ICCR is governed by its Constitution. The Council's activities are overseen by its three statutory bodies – General Assembly, Governing Body and Finance Committee. These bodies provide overall guidance and direction and approve ICCR's budget and Annual Plan of Action. These bodies meet regularly, to monitor implementation of programmes and functioning of the Council.

#### **General Assembly**

As per ICCR's Constitution, ICCR's General Assembly consists of the following:

- i. President
- ii. Three Vice-Presidents
- iii. Director General
- iv. Financial Adviser
- v. Five persons nominated by the Government of India
- vi. Two members of the Lok Sabha nominated by the Speaker of the Lok Sabha and one member of the Rajya Sabha nominated by the Chairman of the Rajya Sabha

- vii. One representative each of the Lalit Kala Akademi, Sahitya Akademi and Sangeet Natak Akademi, to be nominated by the competent authorities of these Academies
- viii. Not more than ten persons eminent in various spheres of Indian Culture to be nominated by the President of the Council in their individual capacity
- ix. Ten eminent artistes from the fields of performing, fine and plastic arts to represent
- x. Fifteen representatives of universities or of institutions deemed to be universities, to be selected by the Governing Body

- xi. Five representatives of prominent scientific and technical institutions to be selected by Governing Body
- xii. Five representatives of research institutions and institutes of higher learning in areas of Humanities and Social Sciences and
- xiii. Five representatives of other organizations interested in the work and objectives of the Council to be selected by Governing Body.

Members of the General Assembly are nominated as mentioned in the list above. Except where otherwise provided, term of General Assembly is three years.

#### Governing body

As per the Constitution the Governing Body consists of the following members:

- i. President,
- ii. Three Vice-Presidents,
- iii. Director General,
- iv. Financial Adviser,
- Three members nominated by the Government of India from among their nominees on the General Assembly,
- vi. Nine members to be elected by the General Assembly from amongst its members of whom at least one shall be a member of the Rajya Sabha and two of the Lok Sabha.

Members of Governing Body are selected from the General Assembly.

#### **Finance Committee**

The Finance Committee consists of the following members:

- i. Chairperson elected by the Finance Committee
- ii. Director General, ICCR
- iii. Financial Adviser, ICCR/MEA

- iv. One nominee of the Government of India
- v. Two representatives of the General Assembly, and
- vi. One representative of the Governing Body.

#### Organization- Indian Cultural Centres & Regional Offices in India

At the organizational level ICCR is headed by the President. Executive head of the Council is the Director General, who is a Secretary or Additional Secretary level officer from the Indian Foreign Service, deputed by the Ministry of External Affairs. Director General is assisted by Deputy Director Generals and Directors

(officers from the Indian Foreign Service), officers from the ICCR cadre and functionaries engaged by the organization as Consultants and outsourced staff. ICCR delivers its functions from its headquarters in New Delhi and through its 19 Regional Offices in various States in India and 39 Indian Cultural Centers overseas.

#### ICCR Headquarters in New Delhi

At headquarters ICCR has sections dedicated to oversee various programmes and overall administration, planning and financial management of the Council. These sections are headed by Director, Deputy Secretary (Senior Programme Director) and Under Secretary (Programme Director) level officers.

#### ICCR's Regional Offices in India

ICCR undertakes outreach activities and programmes

both overseas as well as within the country. Regional Offices (ROs) have been established in various states to oversee scholarship programmes for foreign students located in such states. There has been an incremental increase in ICCR's activities within the country. ROs play an important role in organizing inbound cultural programmes, conferences, seminars, visits and lectures. They also liaise with State Governments, local artists, scholars and universities. ICCR has 19 Regional Offices across different states. Matters related to Delhi NCR are looked after by ICCR headquarters ROs are headed by ICCR cadre officers and/ or MEA officers. The Council has formed Regional Advisory Committees comprising of experts in various fields to offer advice to the Regional Centres. To institutionalize cooperation with State Governments, ICCR has signed Memorandum of Understanding with the following 17 State Governments/ UTs/ Organizations.



#### **Indian Cultural Centres abroad**

When the administrative control of ICCR was transferred to the Ministry of External Affairs, need was felt for establishing the Culture Centres overseas to ensure effective outreach of India's Soft Power interventions in foreign countries. ICCR's Cultural Centres are known as "Indian Cultural Centres (ICCs)" overseas. Countries where the ICCs were first established were the ones with large Indian diaspora presence. "Neighbourhood First" and "Soft Power Projection Priorities" guided establishment of other Cultural Centres. At present ICCR is operating 39 ICCs across the globe, 2 of which are run in Public Private Partnership (PPP) model. Three new Cultural Centres in Paris (France), Tel Aviv (Israel) and Washington DC (USA), are proposed.

#### **Activities in ICCs:**

Indian Cultural Centres are principal instruments for ensuring cultural outreach abroad and projecting India's soft power through a wide range of cultural, academic and intellectual activities, promoting, inter alia, knowledge, information and understanding of various aspects of Indian culture including Indian dance, music, yoga, languages, food, festivals, history, ethos and traditions and contemporary issues. ICCs are headed by a Director and supported by a team of teachers. They closely coordinate with the Mission's Culture, Education and Press wings.

In addition to carrying out various cultural activities, one of the most significant activities undertaken at the Cultural Centres abroad is imparting lessons in Indian classical dances, music, Indian languages and yoga. ICCR posts India-based teachers from its panel of teachers in these disciplines. Since the establishment of the first Cultural Centre overseas in 1972, ICCR has been deputing batches of three to four teachers to these Centres, typically including:

- 1. A classical dance/ music/ instrumental teacher,
- 2. A Hindi teacher and
- 3. A Yoga teacher.

For this purpose, Council periodically empanels teachers and deploys them on short-term contract of 2 years' duration at the Centres.

## iccr Programmes

ICCR receives annual funding in the form of Grants-in-Aid from the Ministry of External Affairs. In addition, it receives funds from other Ministries as well to execute programmes on their behalf as Agency programmes.

- I. Major programmes implemented by ICCR are categorized into:
  - (A) Academic & Intellectual Activity promotion/exchange programmes and,
  - (B) Visual & Performing Arts promotion/exchange programmes.

#### Academic & Intellectual exchange programmes:

These exchanges primarily include programmes targeted towards building long-term relations between India and people from around the world and institutionalizing them for long term impact. These programmes are fully executed and implemented by ICCR. ICCR executes these programmes in coordination with the Education and Culture Wings of the Indian Missions or its own Cultural Centres. Major programmes under this category are:

- Scholarship schemes and welfare of international students,
- 2. Fellowship Programme,
- 3. Chairs of Indian Studies in foreign Universities,
- 4. Conferences and Seminars,
- 5. Visitors' Programmes (Distinguished, Academic, and other Visitors' Programmes),
- ICCR Awards Programme (Alumni, Indology & Sanskrit),


- 7. Promotion of Hindi and Sanskrit including Publication of Gagnanchal,
- 8. IDY celebrations and Promotion of Yoga overseas
- 9. Teaching of languages, dance, music, yoga at Indian Cultural Centres overseas.
- 10. ICCR's Annual lectures (Maulana Azad, Deen Dayal Upadhyaya lectures),
- 11. Maintenance of manuscripts of Maulana Abul Kalam Azad.


#### Visual & Performing Arts promotion/ exchange programmes:

These are short-term project based exchanges, coinciding with a historical event, festival, celebration in a particular country and targeted towards showcasing the wealth of composite Indian culture overseas. These programmes are organized both as stand- alone ICCR events and in collaboration with the Ministries and Departments involved in promotion of similar activities such as the Ministry of Culture, Ministry of Tourism, Ministry of Information & Broadcasting, Development Commissioner of Handicrafts etc. Major programmes under this category are:

- 1. Outgoing Cultural Delegations (from India),
- 2. Incoming Cultural Delegations (from foreign countries to India),
- 3. Festivals of India abroad,
- 4. International Cultural Festivals in India,
- 5. Exhibitions Outgoing
- 6. Exhibitions Incoming
- 7. Busts/Statutes, and
- 8. Presentation.

- II. In addition to ICCR's own programmes, it also organizes and administers various programmes for other Ministries and Departments. Major programmes implemented by ICCR on behalf of various agencies include:
  - 1. Fifteen scholarship schemes for various Divisions of MEA,
  - 2. Three scholarship schemes for Ministry of AYUSH,
  - 3. Targeted cultural programmes for various Divisions of MEA.
  - 4. Conferences & Seminars for MEA

## Academic and Intellectual Exchange Programmes

#### I. Scholarship Programmes

ICCR handles a total of 24 scholarship programmes for foreign students. Of which 15 are administered for Ministry of External Affairs and 03 for Ministry of AYUSH. It offers about 4000 slots under these 06 Scholarship Programmes. Scholarships are offered for various courses (except medical courses) at Under Graduate, Post Graduate, M. Phil and Ph.D. levels in the State and Central Universities and colleges affiliated to them. In addition to mainstream courses, ICCR also offers scholarships for studying Performing Arts under the Guru-Shishya parampara.

#### II. Fellowship Programme

ICCR awards Junior and Senior Research Fellowships to international scholars specializing in different fields/streams of Indian studies. Under this programme, the selected Fellow is affiliated to an academic institution in India. Senior fellowships are given to eminent scholars with proven academic credentials, who have an established body of published works. Junior Fellowships are offered to young research scholars to pursue post-doctoral research on relevant topics.

#### III. Chairs of Indian Studies Abroad

ICCR, in consultation with Indian Missions abroad, has established Chairs of Indian Studies (Political Science, Philosophy, History, Sociology & Economics) & Hindi, Sanskrit, Tamil, Urdu and Bengali Languages in different foreign universities across the globe. The purpose of these Chairs, apart from familiarizing students about India its history and cultural Polity is to serve as a nucleus for Indian Studies and Indian language to develop in academic institutions abroad. Indian faculties deputed to these Chairs not only teach courses on various aspects of India from Politics/ Economy to Society & Culture, but through other academic activities like guidance research, conduct seminars other co-ordinations, publications, delivering public lectures, etc., generate scholarly interactions with the academics of that country as well as students and assist in disseminating information on India and in creating a better appreciation of various India-related issues.

The Council establishes Chairs based on a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed between the Council and the host University/ Institution.

#### IV. Conference and Seminars

Holding of Conferences and Seminars by ICCR is an effective mechanism for exchange of ideas on diverse subjects of relevance and importance to India's culture.

Apart from organizing its own Conferences, ICCR provides support to other Universities/ Educational Institutions to conduct similar activities on subjects that fall under the mandate of ICCR.

#### V. ICCR Awards

ICCR has instituted awards to recognize the contributions of persons in the fields of art, academic research and cultural promotion. It instituted Gisela Bonn Award in year 1996 and three Awards in the year 2015, namely (i) Distinguished Indologist Award, (ii) Distinguished Alumni Award and (iii) World Sanskrit Award.





#### VI. Promotion of Hindi and Sanskrit Overseas

Promotion of Hindi and Sanskrit languages overseas is an important programme of ICCR in connecting people through language. There is a substantial interest in learning Sanskrit in Europe and some of the South East Asian countries.

#### VII. Promotion of Yoga Overseas

ICCR is a principal GOI organization in promotion of yoga overseas. It has been sending yoga teachers/ experts for teaching and promotion of yoga since1980s following establishment of Cultural Centres overseas. June 21, the longest day of the year, was declared as the International Day of Yoga (IDY) in year 2015 by the resolution passed at the UN General Assembly. As per the work distribution between the Government of India Ministries, responsibility of IDY celebrations overseas was entrusted to the Ministry of External Affairs, which in turn entrusted the same to ICCR. Since 2015, ICCR has been a key nodal agency in facilitating celebration of IDY overseas with the help of Indian Missions and Posts abroad.

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#### VIII. Visitors' Programmes

As part of ICCR's efforts to foster & strengthen cultural relations and mutual understanding between India and other countries, ICCR administers the following Visitors' Programmes:

- a. Distinguished Visitors Programme
- b. Academic Visitors Programme
- c. Outgoing Visitors Programme

#### i. Distinguished Visitors Programme:

Under the programme, the Council receives eminent scholars, intellectuals and well-known personalities in the field of politics, academics, art & culture in India to experience Indian culture and interact with institutions and audiences in India. Leading representatives of think-tanks and cultural institutions are invited to share their insight and experiences. The programme, ranging from one week to 10 days, includes visits to various parts of the country, lectures, round table discussions, meetings with Ministers, senior government officials, NGO's & intellectuals, sightseeing to places of historical and touristic attraction.

#### ii. Academic Visitors Programme (AVP):

Under Academic Visitors Programme, the Council invites eminent academicians for a 7 to 10 days visit to India. The programme includes visits to Universities, interactions with students, think tanks, and Public lectures.

#### $iii. Outgoing\ Visitors\ Programme\ (OVP):$

Council also facilitates visits of Indian scholars, intellectuals, academicians and artistes to foreign countries under its Outgoing Visitors Programme. The programme provides an opportunity to the Indian scholars to participate in seminars, conferences and exchange their views with foreign scholars. It also helps in informing about developments in India in various fields. The subjects range from bilateral cultural relations to introduction to India's society and culture, propagation of thoughts and philosophy of eminent Indian thinkers.

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#### IX. Gosh-E-Azad Collection

Main attraction of the ICCR Library is a collection of over 10,000 rare books donated by Maulana Azad. Maulana Azad donated his entire collection of about 10,000 rare and valuable books in Arabic, Persian, Urdu, English, Polish, German, French, Dari and Sanskrit and 196 rare manuscripts in Arabic, Persian, Urdu and Dari. The collection is called Gosha-e-Azad. In coordination with the National Manuscript Mission (NMM), under its ongoing audiovisual-content-digitization programme ICCR has initiated preservation of its collection of 196 rare manuscripts.

These include rare manuscripts of Ameer Khusro, Maulana Rumi, Hafiz Shirazi and Sheikh Saadi besides a carefully curated collection of other rare books. It also commenced digitization of the preserved manuscripts. Once all manuscripts are preserved and digitized these will be made public on ICCR's and NMM's online library.

#### X. ICCR Publication

The Council publishes magazine Gagnanchal in Hindi for distribution in India and abroad.

#### XI. Travel Grants

ICCR to promote exchange of artists and scholars by way of supporting the travel of talented artists and scholars provides travel grants invited by eminent foreign institutes/ organizations/ prestigious festivals/ museums/ local bodies & Centres promoting Indian culture to present their art works/ performances/ research papers/ talks/ presentations.

# Performing and Visual Arts Exchange Programmes

#### I. Exhibitions – Incoming and Outgoing

Under the bilateral Cultural Exchange Programmes with other countries and under its own programme of activities, the Council sponsors exhibitions of Indian art and crafts to foreign countries and receives exhibitions from abroad for expositions in India. In addition, exhibitions are also organized for display as part of ICCR's various Festivals of Indian Culture abroad. ICCR owns a collection of 27 exhibitions of paintings, photographs and textiles, which are sent for display abroad on specific requests by Indian Mission/Posts.

ICCR houses an Art Gallery and organizes exhibitions by Indian and foreign artists.

#### II. Bust and Statues

The Council has an ongoing programme of presenting busts and statues of Indian icons or sculptures of historical significance for installation in other countries.

#### III. Outgoing Cultural Delegation

Outgoing Cultural Delegation Programme is intended to propagate Indian culture by sending performing art groups abroad to present their performances at the events organized by ICCR, or Missions or as part of cultural festivals, or participating in the host country's cultural festivals. ICCR sends artists and groups empanelled with it. ICCR covers wide range of genres under its panel of artists.

#### **Cultural Festivals Abroad**

Under the Festivals of India initiative launched in the 1980s, ICCR took large-scale Cultural Programmes to Russia and Europe to display aspects of India's performing, visual and other art forms, including Indian dances, music, handicrafts, exhibitions, gastronomy, fashion and films. Most of the large-scale Cultural Festivals of India are now coordinated by the Ministry of Culture. However ICCR continues to organize medium to small Cultural Festivals, and also collaborates with Ministry of Culture in organizing large-scale festivals.





#### IV. Incoming Cultural Delegations (from foreign countries to India)

Under the bilateral cultural exchanges and commitments under Cultural Exchange Programme (CEP), ICCR receives incoming cultural delegations from all over the world, which are exhibited to Indian audience through stand-alone events or Cultural Festivals organized on an annual basis.

The Regional Offices also provide artistes in the different states a platform to show their talent by arranging their performances under the Horizon Series.



# ICCR Scholarships

During the year 2018-19, ICCR offered 3930 scholarship slots for various courses including Performing Arts, Ayurveda, Unani, Siddha and Homeopathy under various scholarship schemes to foreign nationals to pursue UG/ PG/ M.Phil / Ph.D level courses in Indian Universities/ Institutes.

In the year under review, ICCR provided 2,498 scholarships, from 3,930 slots, to foreign students aspiring to study in India. In its first full year of implementation, the Admission to Alumni (A2A) portal received and processed applications for grant of scholarships. The portal not only expedited the process, but also offered wider choices to the students. In October 2018, November 2018, and February 2019 orientation programmes and other welfare activities for newly admitted foreign students were organized in Delhi and regional Centres in Bangalore, Mumbai, Pune, Kolkata, Guwahati and Ahmedabad. Winter camps for all the foreign students were organized in Delhi and Bengaluru from January 2 to January 10, 2019. President, ICCR addressed all the participants in Delhi and participants in Bengaluru through video

conference.

The second meeting of the Joint Working Group on HRD, Education and Culture between Afghanistan and India was held on o8 August, 2018 at ICCR Headquarters. Director General, ICCR Mrs. Riva Ganguly Das, and H.E. Ms. Sayed Mojgen Mostafri, Minister of Education, Government of Afghanistan, cochaired the meeting. Research and Information System on behalf of MEA, Government of India, conducted an evaluation of the Special Scholarship Scheme for Afghan Nationals (SSSAN). They lauded the logistical and overall support provided by ICCR to the program. New scheme Afghan Nationals Defence and Security Forces for the children of Afghan Martyrs was operationalized this year.

# ICCR Chairs

During the year ICCR administered 66 Chairs across the globe. During this period, 14 new MoUs were signed for establishment of Chairs and 9 Professors were deployed as ICCR Chairs.

The Council organized three Selection Committee meetings on 30 August 2018 at ICCR Headquarters to screen and interview candidates in the field of Political Science, History and Economics for deputation at Indian Chairs.

Detailed syllabus for teaching Hindi language and literature was approved as a standard course and sent to all HoM's and HoP's. The material was designed by Kendriya Hindi Sansthan (KHS), Agra and Mahatma Gandhi Antarrashtriya Hindi Vishwavidyalaya (MGAHV), Wardha.







# iccr Library



## **Governing Body:**


Governing Body meetings were held thrice in 2018-2019 on April 12, 2018, October 25, 2018 and January 10, 2019.

Members of Governing Body are selected from the General Assembly.

### **Finance Committee:**

During the financial year 2018-19, a meeting of Finance Committee was held on August 08, 2018.

In 2018-19, Council deputed 18 new Directors to various Indian Cultural Centres abroad.



# ICCR E-Governance and Information Technology

ICCR has taken initiatives in e-Governance and Information Technology for improvement in processes.

A2A Scholarship Portal - The A2A Scholarship portal was launched in Jan 2018 for receiving applications online for admission of foreign students in Indian Universities and Institutes.

Around 3895 applications were forwarded by Indian Missions till 31st August 2018 for the academic year 2018-19. Admissions were given to 2498 students under ICCR scholarship schemes that were confirmed by various Universities and institutes.

E-Tendering - E-procurement processes at ICCR have been upgraded from E-publishing to complete E-tendering from January 2019. ICCR has started bids submission, opening, evaluation online publishing including order placement. All tender related fees (viz; tender fee, EMDs, etc) are received online. ICCR has engaged services of M/s ITI Limited who has implemented E-Tendering for ICCR through their software Tender Wizard, free of charge. Some of the tenders where response was found to be inadequate in online process, had to be started in physical form.

E-Office - To reduce paper and to automate workflow processes including digitization of old records, ICCR has hired NIC cloud space for implementing E-Office. After the launch of E-Office application on 19.3.2019 at ICCR all file movements are being processed by E-Office.

Direct Benefit Transfer - ICCR has implemented total of nine schemes registered in the DBT Bharat Portal. Total of Rs 108,872,108 (Upto Feb) has been disbursed to beneficiaries by ICCR and the data for each Scheme has been updated in the DBT Bharat Portal.

Communication Network Strengthening - With the implementation of new applications resulting in increase in network traffic, ICCR communication network has been upgraded with bandwidth/ leased connectivity to 100 Mbps and the local Area Network (LAN) has been augmented to high speed LAN.

## ICCR Regional Offices

The Council seeks to optimize functioning of its Regional Offices and with the view to draw best talent and ideas has constituted Regional Advisory Committees (RACs). The RAC is an informal entity whose members are selected on the basis of different areas of expertise of the individual concerned. At present, RACs in 14 regions namely – (i) Ahmedabad (ii) Bengaluru (iii) Bhubaneshwar (iv) Bhopal (v) Chennai (vi) Chandigarh (vii) Goa (viii) Hyderabad (ix) Kolkata (x) Mumbai (xi) Pune (xii) Thiruvananthapuram

(xiii) Lucknow (xiv) Varanasi have been constituted. Meetings of the RACs for 9 Regional Offices namely – Mumbai, Kolkata, Pune, Bhopal, Chennai, Goa, Hyderabad, Chandigarh and Bengaluru have already been held under the Chairmanship of President, ICCR.

The Council also organized training/ orientation programme for RAC members at ICCR, New Delhi in March 2019.

## ICCR Finance & Accounts

The Council received a sum of Rs. 19894.00 lakhs as Grant-in-Aid for the Financial Year 2018-19 from the Ministry of External Affairs in 1st, 2nd and 3rd installment against sanctioned BE- 2018-19 of Rs. 25500.00 lakhs which has been revised to Rs.23500.00 lakhs at RE. A sum of Rs. 13047.65 lakhs was received from MEA & other organizations on behalf of Agency Work done by ICCR on their behalf. Rs. 3533.56 lakhs are due on

account of Africa Scholarship and AYUSH Scholarship (BIMSTEC) Schemes of Agency work because of payment of scholarship during current financial year. The Expenditure up to 31<sup>st</sup> January, 2019 incurred by the Council (including Agency work) during the F/Y 2018-19 was Rs. 26375.84 lakhs (Rs.17111.26+Rs.9264.58 lakhs)\*.

In an endeavour to improve ICCR's internal financial and regulatory management following steps have been undertaken.

- i) Thematic Audit on the functioning of ICC's at Missions and Posts abroad was conducted by O/o DGACE from 23<sup>rd</sup> July, 2018 to 22<sup>nd</sup> November, 2018.
- ii) The Certification Audit of ICCR's Accounts for F.Y. 2017-18 has been conducted by O/o DGACE from 17th December, 2018 to 09th January, 2019. The Report of Certification audit was received on 15<sup>th</sup> March 2019.
- iii) Transaction Audit was conducted by O/o DGACE from 10<sup>th</sup> January, 19 to 15<sup>th</sup> February, 2019.
- iv) Internal Audit by O/o Principal CCA was conducted from 04<sup>th</sup> to 08<sup>th</sup> February, 2019 for the financial year 2016-17 and 2017-18.
- v) Internal Audit by a team from ICCR Headquarters was conducted in respect of its regional offices in Patna and Kolkata in May, 2018.
- (vi) Annual Accounts of the Council for the financial year 2017-18 has been approved by the Finance Committee and Governing Body meetings held on 08.08.2018 and 25.10.2018 respectively. On receipt of the Audit Certificate, the Annual Accounts for the year 2017-18 alongwith Annual Report for the financial year 2017-18 was laid on the table of both houses of Parliament on 3<sup>rd</sup> July (Lok Sabha) and 4<sup>th</sup> July 2019 (Rajya Sabha).
